The Lord delivered one of His key messages during the darkest time in His life on earth. Pilate, a governor who held the responsibility to determine crucifixion, asked Him: "What have you done?" Jesus answered with a seeming non-sequitur, "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36).

Heaven is the place to which the Lord is leading. Life continues after death. A goal in life is to live spiritually even in this natural world. The Lord's own crucifixion and resurrection reminds us that life is eternal, having a trajectory well beyond the few years we live here.

The constant aim of the church is to remind us all of our spiritual lives, and to help us to make that choice to prioritize the things of the Lord's kingdom.

One teaching puts it this way: "Everyone can recognize, if they give the matter consideration, that they are living in two kingdoms, the spiritual kingdom and the natural one. They are also able to think one more important than the other, that is, to have one rather than the other in view" (*Arcana Coelestia* 4104).

The opportunity before each of us, then, is to consider what that spiritual prioritization looks like. Is it a focus on pre-Easter readings from the Word? Is it a consideration of what the Lord would want us to do in a decision before us? Is it a focus on spiritual improvement that we have been putting off? Is it a commitment to be considerate and helpful to the people in our lives?

Thank you for being a part of the church, and contributing to the spiritual focus that all of us are called to.

There has been a lot of "adult" talk about the problems we are facing today in the church and throughout the world. How much of the problem is created by us? By those tendencies in us that want to strip everything down to its components, spread all the pieces across the table, and check each part for defects? Or an even simpler instinct we have to break things down into two piles, functional (with me) and not functional (against me). Perhaps, it is our "adult" minds trying to find blame, and dwelling on problems too much, that is the very cause of our unrest and anxieties.

Instead of gathering to perform autopsies together, wouldn't it be more productive to create something together? I get so much more fulfilled and energized when I spend time with people who want to collaborate and invent. The best solution to a problem could exist by working past it. The problem wants you to think that by dwelling on it, it will be fixed, when in reality you may be feeding it. Maybe, we don't want to lead up search parties where we know what we're looking for, but scavenger hunts where we won't know what we'll find until we see it? Or maybe the hunt never ends? The fun is in the doing. And the "fixing" is in the doing good. And most of the time they are the same.

Take a break from being an "adult" about everything and bring some child-like energy to your next task, project, or gathering. Go, take pleasure in building something... with others. Quiet the voice that says "this will never work" or "they're doing it wrong", and turn up the volume on "this could work" or "let's see what happens?" Think of the endless things created by the Lord's love and love and wisdom and you won't feel like an "adult"

The Lord took some of the worst behaving people on the planet and created His Word from stories about them. He "scavenged" all the good and true things that communicated with His heavens and used them to build an ever advancing church of love, wisdom, and use.

The quote above comes from angels revealing the source of unending delights that a husband and wife share when experiencing true married love. They explain that it is from love and wisdom, from the Lord, united in useful service that unearth these boundless treasures - treasures that are discovered anywhere there is love and wisdom in use, in anybody, anywhere, anytime. Think of the endless things created by the Lord's love and wisdom and you won't feel like an "adult" anymore.

The other day, a child at our school gave me a picture he had drawn. I said "Thank you so much! Is this a picture of a carrot, I love carrots!" He looked up at me as if I was nuts and replied, "No, Mr. Acton, that is a snake. You're silly." I had a feeling it wasn't a carrot, but I thought it would be fun to be "silly." We looked at his picture a little longer and we both discovered new things in it, that we hadn't noticed initially. He didn't mind a bit that something he had drawn to be a snake could be seen as something different. He had no ownership over his creation. He was happy to stand there and "create" new ways of seeing things with me.
